- Shared Instrumentation Grant / Small Animal Irradiator Users Needed: To upgrade and extend RUMIC/CMR services, they are submitting an S10 grant (Shared Instrumentation Grant, SIG, due June 1) to support the purchase of an irradiator to replace an existing outdated unit. The new irradiator will be able to deliver focused radiation to tumors/organs of rats and mice and can administer metered whole-body radiation to induce immunosuppression or to evaluate the efficacy of radiation-mitigating agents. RUMIC/CMR invites your participation as a major or minor user of the system. Contributors to the application will be able to utilize their support services to arrange and conduct exposures.
