RARC DEI Spotlight

- A new study, led by RARC researcher, **Dr. Sarah Brislin**, published in the *Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry*, underscores the disproportionate exposure of Black youth to school exclusionary discipline and police contact. The study demonstrates that Black youth, particularly Black males, experience disciplinary actions at younger ages and are at higher risk for receiving increasingly severe disciplinary measures compared to White youth, even after controlling for delinquency, sex, and neighborhood factors. - Rutgers Health-IDEA Grants program for innovations in inclusion, diversity, equity, and advocacy. Faculty, staff, students, and trainees are encouraged to apply. Rutgers News

- With sports betting now legalized in 38 states, including D.C., the industry has seen rapid growth, with Americans betting over \$220 billion on sports by the five-year anniversary of the decision. Dr. Lia Nower, director of the Center for Gambling Studies, highlights to National Geographic, the accessibility of gambling through smartphones, emphasizing the shift from traditional venues like casinos to online platforms, which has contributed to concerns about increased addiction, especially among youth. - A Rutgers Health study finds that quitting smoking during pregnancy may lead to increased complications related to weight gain and blood pressure, but the benefits outweigh the risks. Their study, published in Hypertension, analyzed over 22 million pregnancies and found that quitting smoking reduced the risk of stillbirth by more than 80% and lowered the rate of preterm delivery. The researchers recommend offering nutrition counseling to minimize weight gain while encouraging smoking cessation to ensure parents and babies benefit from improved pregnancy outcomes. - According to the latest Rutgers-Eagleton Poll, with the Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey,
 most New Jerseyans are familiar with the storage and disposal of opioids and other medications.
 Less than 3 in 10 report that they or a family member has been prescribed opioids for pain
 medication in the past two years, marking a decline since 2018. Despite increased awareness, nearly
 4 in 10 New Jerseyans report having a family member or close friend who is or has been addicted to
 drugs, with disparities across income levels and education backgrounds. For more information, click

The Summit aims to provide various stakeholders the opportunity to participate in panels and breakout sessions that assist individuals with navigating addiction and recovery pathways. During the program, participants will work individually or with their team to assess if their pharmaceutical, digital health, or medical device-related inventions can be transformed into innovations to address challenges in SUDs. - PAR-23-244: Population Approaches to Reducing Alcohol-related Cancer Risk: This Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) aims to support research on interdisciplinary population approaches to increasing awareness of the relationship between alcohol and cancer risk, understanding and changing social norms related to alcohol consumption, and developing and/or evaluating alcohol policy approaches.
