Rutgers News

- **Dr. Diane Calello, from the New Jersey Poison Information and Education System**, emphasized to *NBC Philadelphia* the alarming rise in poisonings linked to tianeptine, noting her office has seen that people poisoned by the drug exhibit agitation, delirium, seizures and cardiac arrest, and in some cases, fatalities. This surge has spurred calls for regulatory action at both federal and industry levels to address the dangers associated with the supplement. For more information, <u>click here</u>.
- The **Rutgers University Behavioral Health Care (UBHC) Center for Integrated Care (CIC)** has received nearly \$2.6M in federal grants and funding to work with its partners throughout the state to train behavioral health clinicians, nurses and nurse practitioners, and physician assistants in integrated care and integrated substance use disorder treatment. - The Office for Research announced that they are now accepting applications for the 2024 Busch Biomedical Grants Program. This program is an internal funding opportunity designed to enhance biomedical research at Rutgers and to strengthen the competitive position of faculty who seek external research funds. Funding is available through two separate award tracks: Early Career Pilot Grants and New Direction Pilot Grants. Both tracks will support research projects up to a total of \$60,000 over two years. - The Rutgers University Molecular Imaging Core (RUMIC) and the Advanced Preclinical Imaging Lab (APIL) offers tours throughout April 2024. - Innovations for Substance Use Disorders: Application for the 2024 cohort is now open! I4SUD is an executive education certificate program offered to select applicants for free through Johns Hopkins Carey Business School (JHU CBS). The program will enroll 30 researchers who are motivated to solve challenges related to substance use disorders (SUDs). During the program, participants will work individually or with their team to assess if their pharmaceutical, digital health, or medical device-related inventions can be transformed into innovations to address challenges in SUDs. - American Board of Professional Psychology (ABPP): You can now become board certified in Addiction Psychology under the American Board of Professional Psychology (ABPP)! The ABPP certifies that you have the evidence-based psychological knowledge and skills for evaluating and treating addictive disorders (chemical and behavioral). • **Diversity Specialized Predoctoral to Postdoctoral Advancement in Neuroscience Award** - This twophase award aims to facilitate the completion of the doctoral dissertation and transition of talented graduate students to strong neuroscience research postdoctoral positions by providing 1-2 years of graduate support and up to 4 years of postdoctoral support. The D-SPAN award is intended to support a defined pathway to independent research positions for talented graduate students from diverse backgrounds, including those from groups that are underrepresented in neuroscience research. - PAR-23-244: Population Approaches to Reducing Alcohol-related Cancer Risk: This Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) aims to support research on interdisciplinary population approaches to increasing awareness of the relationship between alcohol and cancer risk, understanding and changing social norms related to alcohol consumption, and developing and/or evaluating alcohol policy approaches.
