Rutgers News

- A study conducted by **Rutgers Nursing doctoral program project** found that replacing long-acting opioids with immediate-release opioids after total knee replacement surgery yielded comparable pain management but reduced nausea-medication usage and need for residential rehabilitation post-discharge. The findings, published in *Pain Management Nursing*, highlight the potential benefits of transitioning to immediate-release opioids post-surgery, with implications for enhancing patient experience and rehabilitation outcomes. - In her latest *Medium* blog, **Dr. Danielle Dick, director of RARC,** highlights the persistent prevalence of recreational substance use despite increasing evidence of its harmful effects. Exploring genetic factors linked to addiction risk through externalizing and internalizing pathways, she emphasizes the importance of understanding these influences to make informed decisions and mitigate risks. DNA is not destiny in determining one's relationship with substances. For more information, <u>click here</u>.
- A study published in the Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs reveals alarming trends in compliance with laws prohibiting the service of alcohol to visibly intoxicated patrons in the San Francisco Bay area. Despite legal mandates, only 21% of establishments refused service to obviously intoxicated individuals, as demonstrated by "pseudo-patrons" working with researchers. The findings underscore the need for more rigorous enforcement and comprehensive approaches, including improved training for servers and heightened community awareness, to mitigate alcohol-related harm and promote public safety.
