• In her OpEd on NJ.com, 3rd-year medical student **Tayra Luisana Keshinover** highlights the critical role of primary care in underserved communities and the pressing need to diversify the physician workforce. She shares her personal journey from a low-income, Spanish-speaking household to medical school and advocates for increased support and pathways for

• Each summer, the **New Jersey Poison Control Center at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School** sees a rise in calls about seasonal hazards, including the dangers of alcohol exposure. With more people purchasing alcoholic beverages in the summer, there's an increased risk of children accidentally drinking alcohol, which can lead to life-threatening symptoms. To prevent accidental exposures, experts recommend keeping alcoholic drinks separate from nonalcoholic ones and always reading labels carefully to distinguish between them. Topics of interest include stress manipulations, trait predictors, trauma history, and various life stressors. Papers featuring impaired control over alcohol use, heavy episodic drinking, and sufficient gender representation will be prioritized, with a broad age range of participants encouraged. • Innovations for Substance Use Disorders: Application for the 2024 cohort is now open! I4SUD is an executive education certificate program offered to select applicants for free through Johns Hopkins Carey Business School (JHU CBS). The program will enroll 30 researchers who are motivated to solve challenges related to substance use disorders (SUDs). During the program, participants will work individually or with their team to assess if their pharmaceutical, digital health, or medical device-related inventions can be transformed into innovations to address challenges in SUDs. - NOT-DA-24-029: High-Priority Interest to Enhance Data Science Research Training in Addiction Research: Data science is an important cross-cutting research approach in the 2022 2026 NIDA Strategic Plan, and increasing the capacity of experts in data science for biomedical research of drug addiction is critical. The purpose of this Notice is to highlight NIDA's high-priority interest in receiving applications that will support training and career development in Data Science within the overall field of drug addiction research. Grants supported under this Notice can be from individuals at formative career stages or from established investigators proposing training programs that will support early career scientists.
